Welcome Message

From the Conference and Festival Director

Welcome to "Continuities and Innovations," the first International Conference and Festival of Popular Print Culture at the University of Alberta. The Conference and Festival are part of a larger research program on Popular Print: Past and Present, Local and Global. This program includes the multi-volume *Oxford History of Popular Print Culture*, to be published by the Oxford University Press. Several of the volume editors are at the Conference and giving presentations.

The larger research program also includes a series of database/websites documenting popular print, local and global, from sites around the world. To host this documentary material, the research program has developed a free, open-source database engine called "Streetprint" (www. streetprint.org) already being adopted by libraries, galleries, businesses, and individuals in several countries, for various purposes. The research program will continue to develop new versions of Streetprint.

The aim of the Conference and Festival and the research program of which they are a part is to address this situation: What most people read, we (university researchers) rarely study; what we study, most people don't read—unless they have to, in school or a college course. Meanwhile, popular print has disappeared and continues to disappear, often read to pieces, and until recently seldom kept by libraries or national archives. To address this situation, it is necessary to bring together researchers, teachers, readers, writers, librarians, publishers, fans, collectors, booksellers and others to share collections, experiences, knowledge, and insights. So, we are hosting a Comics Festival and a Writers Festival, alongside the Conference and open to the public. The research program on popular print culture will continue to develop new initiatives, and will host future conferences and festivals.

We on the organizing team hope you enjoy the 2008 Conference and Festival and your visit to Edmonton and the University of Alberta. And we hope to see you again for our next Conference!

Conference Protocol

In the interests of making our tightly scheduled days run as smoothly and fairly as possible, we ask that you take a moment to review this information for presenters and moderators.

- 1. Speakers and moderators should arrive 10 minutes before the panel begins to ensure each panel begins on time. Those requiring technical support should arrive slightly earlier, in case of any unexpected computer problems.
- 2. Each speaker will be introduced (name, university affiliation, title of paper) by the moderator, and given 20 minutes in which to deliver the paper. The moderator will show the speaker a sign when 5 minutes remain, and when 3 minutes remain. When I minute remains the moderator will display a sign to the speaker and the audience, and will do the same when time has expired. The moderator will stop the speaker one minute after time has expired. Time your presentations carefully to avoid this!
- 3. Once all presentations (not each presentation) are complete, the moderator will open up the floor to questions. The moderator will take note of the order in which hands are raised, and will be responsible for selecting the next questioner. If no questions are immediately forthcoming, the moderator will lead the discussion with an opening question. Moderators are also encouraged to involve all of the presenters in the question period this may require posing questions to presenters who have not received many of them by the end of the period. All panels must end on time.
- 4. Moving between concurrent panels is acceptable, but please avoid leaving rooms and especially entering rooms when a speaker is presenting. If you do wish to move from one panel to another, please do so between presentations.
- 5. Since panels are being held in close proximity to others, it is important to be aware that your panel might end more quickly than the others. Maintaining relative quiet in the hallways will ensure panels are not interrupted by the noise of another panel ending.

SEEING THE WORLD OF SOUND: THE COVER ART OF FOLKWAYS RECORDS Co-Curated by Joan Greer, Department of Art and Design (University of Alberta) and Margaret Asch • Hallway, 2nd floor Humanities Centre, University of Alberta

The University of Alberta is home to a complete set of Folkways recordings donated by Folkways Records founder, Moses Asch. Asch's aim in establishing the company was to record and document sound from around the world. In a unique partnership with the Smithsonian Institution, the University of Alberta has digitized and archived the collection, creating *folkwaysAlive!*, a resource for research, teaching and community engagement.

These panels celebrate the rich visual archive found in the cover art and design of this collection and explore how the visual relates to and complements the recorded sound. They represent a portion of a larger exhibition of Folkways Records cover art that was held at the Fine Arts Building Gallery in 2005 that is currently being developed as a virtual exhibition. These panels have also been exhibited at the Smithsonian Institution in Washington DC and folk music festivals in Alberta.

CHRISTINE BOLD (GUELPH U)

"Cowboys and Publishers: U.S. Popular Print Culture, 1880-1924"

Christine Bold is Professor of English at the University of Guelph. She is author of three books—Writers, Plumbers, and Anarchists: The WPA Writers' Project in Massachusetts (University of Massachusetts Press, 2006); The WPA Guides: Mapping America (University Press of Mississippi, 1999); and Selling the Wild West: Popular Western Fiction, 1860-1960 (Indiana University Press, 1987)—as well as numerous chapters and articles on popular culture and cultural memory. She has also coauthored the award-winning book Remembering Women Murdered by Men: Memorials across Canada (Sumach Press, 2006) by the Cultural Memory Group, a collaboration between academics and social justice workers. Professor Bold's scholarship has been supported by substantial grants from the Social Sciences and Humanities Research Council (SSHRC) of Canada and awards from the United States Embassy and the Canada-U.S. Fulbright Program. She has served as president of the Canadian Association for American Studies (1995-97) and has coedited the Canadian Review of American Studies (1991-97). Currently, she is writing a revisionist history of popular westerns, supported by a SSHRC research grant.

Brian Maidment is Research Professor in the History of Print at Salford University, UK. He has written on a wide range of nineteenth century topics, including writing by working men and women, Ruskin, and Victorian periodicals. More recent work has been on visual culture in the 1820s and 1830s, especially the illustration of down market magazines, books and fiction, following on from his 1996 book *Reading Popular Prints 1780-1870*. His most recent book is *Dusty Bob - A Cultural History of Dustmen 1790-1870* (2007) which draws on a broad range of texts and images drawn from journalism, fiction, the theatre and caricature. Current projects include a book called *Comedy, Caricature and the Social Order 1820-1850* and editing the Victorian volume of the *Oxford History of Popular Print Culture*.

Artists' Books from the Home Museum offers an exciting glimpse into the vanguard of the artist book movement. The artists represented by this exhibition chose to work in this format to afford them the opportunity to have their works seen by a broader audience than traditional art forms like painting or sculpture. This was in part because their works could be circulated outside of the conventional gallery system. While the designation of "book" has been applied to these works, some of these artists manipulate our assumptions about what a book is and make use of the medium to call attention to how we engage with them as objects. Examples of this include Ed Ruscha's concertina-folded panorama Every Building on the Sunset Strip and Bruce Fier's Book of Change which consists of seven lead pages weighing forty pounds each with two wooden crates as the cover.

RICHARD NILE (CURTIN U)

"The Century Belongs to the Novelist"

Richard Nile has held academic positions at: the University of Queensland, variously as Deputy Director, Executive Director and Director of the Australian Studies Centre (1993-2000); London as Deputy Director of the Menzies Centre (1989-1992); and the UWA and UNSW as a lecturer (1986-1989), before arriving at Curtin University in 2000 as the foundation Professor of Australian Studies and Director of the Australian Studies Centre (2000-2003) and the Australia Research Institute (2004-2008). He was elected to the Royal Society of Arts in 2006 and appointed as the University of Copenhagen's Distinguished Visiting Professor (Australian Studies) in 2007. Professor Nile edited the Journal of Australian Studies for 11 years to 2007 before taking over Australian Culture and History (both are rated Class A journals), and has edited and produced the work of hundreds of scholars across approximately 1000 research publications. He co-founded the International Australian Studies Association and the European Australian Studies Association, and created the Australian Public Intellectual Network http://www.api-network.com. He serves on editorial boards across Australia, Europe, India, USA and Canada. Professor Nile has published 16 books, including global editions and multiple translations, 40 refereed articles/chapters, 50+ feature articles for national media.
